

Dear Fellow Members, The General Manager's Report in this magazine

outlines the work done in hotel rooms and fire services upgrading. Necessary repairs to windows at the front of the building have commenced. Your Board is actively pursuing heritage grants to assist with the cost not only of this work but also future repairs to the western wall.

I would like to welcome all our Members and Guests to the second edition

of our magazine for 2006. I have recently received many enquiries regarding our Rooms Upgrade Program, speaking more specifically, they request information as to what is actually being addressed in the rooms and when can we expect those refurbishments to be completed.

I would just like to take this opportunity to let those interested know just what we have done thus far, the main elements of these two upgrades, "as they near completion," have focused upon the following areas:

- Bedding new bed spreads, pillows and pillowcases - in all rooms
- Flat Screen Televisions new in all rooms
- Mahogany Television Cabinets new in most rooms
- Mahogany reading tables, chairs and lamps in all rooms - new in all rooms
- Replacement of existing wall prints with historical photographs
 new in all rooms
- Upgrade amenities in bathrooms
 in all rooms
- Replace all existing television cabling - in all rooms
- Install FOXTEL in all rooms
- Replacement of soft furnishings
 in all rooms
- Refurbish all foyers and corridors

- on all floors
- Re-painting deliver program to repaint all rooms
- Re-key all guest rooms
- Install new Digital CCTV security system

So as you can see from the above listing we have been very busy since we initiated these upgrades in July of last year, once completed we will have the best facilities and services that this Club and Hotel has had to offer Members and Guests.



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Famous Mason Geries III

Sir Thomas Johnstone Lipton 1850 - 1931

Undoubtedly, the one member of Lodge Scotia in Glasgow who has achieved most fame as a Freemason was Sir Thomas Lipton; he was initiated into Lodge Scotia on 31st May 1870. Thomas Lipton was born at 13 Crown Street in Glasgow on the 10th of May in 1850 of Irish immigrant parents.

As a young man he sailed to America as a steerage passenger on the Anchor Line, staying there for five years, during which time he took up work where he could find it, firstly on a rice plantation, then as a tramcar driver, a fireman, and, finally, as a grocer's assistant in a New York department store.

His hard work had obviously been well rewarded, for he returned to
Glasgow in 1870 with savings amounting to approximately £100, all of
which he used wisely, on his twenty-first birthday, he opened his first shop
at 101 Stobcross Street in Finnieston.

Within ten years he had outlets all over Britain to gain control over prices and quality, he bought over most of the companies who had originally supplied him with goods, including tea, coffee and cocoa plantations in Ceylon, baking houses, fruit farming interests and rubber estates in a variety of locations, packing houses for pork products in Chicago, and British bacon-curing factories. The year 1898 held special significance for him, because he was Knighted by

Queen Victoria for his contribution to the business world and for his many and varied charitable works. Appropriately, he actually received his Knighthood at the Queen's holiday residence on the Isle of Wight, only a few miles South-East of Cowes, the headquarters of the Royal Yacht Squadron, which was later to play a prominent part in his life.

While he was consolidating his business interests in London, and mainly because of his yachting interests, he became friendly with Edward the Seventh, then Prince of Wales, and his wife, Alexandra of Denmark. Co-incidentally, Edward had been a Patron of Scottish Freemasonry since 1870, the year of Thomas ipton's Initiation.


In 1899, he made the first of five challenges for the America's Cup in a yacht named "Shamrock". Subsequent attempts were made in 1901, 1903, 1920 and 1930, all of which failed, but his repeated efforts endeared him to the American public, who collected subscriptions and presented him with a Loving Cup engraved "To possibly the World's worst yacht builder, but absolutely the World's most cheerful loser".

When Queen Victoria died early in 1901, her eldest son, Albert Edward, succeeded her on the Throne as King Edward 7th, and he then honoured his friend Thomas Lipton by initially inducting him into the Royal Victorian Order as a Knight Commander of the Order (KCVO) and then, only one year later, by conferring a Baronetcy on him continuing in this same vein, Lipton was appointed an Honorary Colonel of the 6th Volunteer Battalion of the Highland Light Infantry, and a Lieutenant of the City of London, representing the King.

In 1909, he put up the football trophy competed for by tiny West Auckland of England and mighty Juventus of Italy. The score line of 2-0 in favour of West Auckland inspired another trophy, "The Lipton Crown of Italy World Cup" which cost £105, and was contested by teams from Germany, Italy, Switzerland and England, and is generally thought to have been the inspiration behind the formation of the World Cup as it now stands.

His varied interests did not go unnoticed, for he received the "Grand Order of the Crown of Italy and of the Order of St. Sava" from the King of Italy in April 1910.

He was the principal speaker during the first authenticated wireless telephone call across the Atlantic in October 1922, and then in 1923, he was made a Burgess of the City of Glasgow, receiving the Freedom of the City at a



ceremony in St. Andrew's Halls, because of the "exemplary and patriotic services he had rendered during the Great War. He had plied his yacht 'Erin' between Marseilles in France and Salonika in Greece. carrying urgently required medical supplies, until sunk by a hostile submarine in a one-sided contest". Despite all his achievements and his fame and fortune, one thing especially dear to his heart had always eluded him, but this was put right on 13th May 1931, when he learned that he had finally been elected to membership of the Royal Yacht Squadron.

Unfortunately, he had little time left to him to enjoy what turned out to be his final triumph, for he died on 2nd October that year at his home, "Osidge", which stood on a sixty acre estate in Southgate, Middlesex. His will specifically mentioned how the estate of approximately one million pounds was to be distributed, including the large house in Middlesex where he spent his last years, which was to be converted for use as a nursing home. The considerable residue of his estate was given to the City of Glasgow for disbursement to charitable causes in

the area.

He was a great ambassador for
Freemasonry in general and Lodge
Scotia in particular and at the time of
his death, he was the oldest member
of Lodge Scotia in Glasgow.

He was certainly one of the greatest entrepreneurs and philanthropists of his day, and these words from the New York Times upon his passing encapsulate exactly how

he would wish to be remembered in death, simply stated:- "they will speak his name in superlatives".

PRIMARY ACTIVITIES OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF SYDNEY

As a major service club, The Rotary Club of Sydney is actively engaged in the raising of funds for worthwhile community causes. This work is spearheaded by the President's Project, with each successive

President promoting a major fund raising activity during their term of office. This year, President Adrian Pilton, through the Rotary Club of Sydney is hoping to raise \$125,000 to provide a new Ambulance for NETS which is a clinical component of the PSN (Pregnancy and newborn Services Network) of NSW.

This Network is responsible for the planning and coordination of tertiary perinatal services in the state of NSW in Australia. From an operational point of view, the PSN includes the Australian Capital Territory (Canberra). NETS is a key component of paediatric critical care services, under the auspices of the Paediatric ICU Working Group of the NSW Department of Health.

The major impact of NETS extends beyond patient transport; in that it provides a point of clinical triage for patients too sick for normal ambulance transfer between hospitals. It connects clinicians in referring and referral (destination) hospitals in a telephone conference to discuss the best treatment, appropriateness of transfer or retrieval. This extends to obstetric cases when maternal transfer no longer seems possible and a neonatal retrieval will be needed. Often the process succeeds in achieving fetal transfer appropriately. even when neonatal transport has been deemed inevitable. It also acts as a clinical coordination point for critically ill or injured infants and children.

Other excellent on-going projects such as The Adrian Gold Gift of Life Program, the Joan Salter Fund, Youth Exchange and the Mt. Eliza Rotary Scholarship Program, are coordinated through the club's four major committees: Community Service, International Service, Vocational Service and Youth Service.

CELLO'S WINTER DECADENCE

Rich Baked Cheesecake topped with warm Strawberry Coulis

Ingredients

Base:

- 1 x 250g packet of Granita biscuits or similar sweetened biscuits
- 1/4 cup dessicated coconut
- 150g unsalted butter

Filling:

- 2 x 250g packets of cream cheese
- 300ml of sour cream
- 1/2 cup castor sugar
- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 tbpn lemon juice
- 2 tsp finely grated lemon rind
- Tip: reduced fat cream cheese and sour cream may be substituted

Strawberry Coulis:

- 2 punnets of fresh strawberries
- 1 cup castor sugar
- 2 tablespoons Grand Marnier or your favourite liqueur

Serves 10

Pre-heat oven to 160°C, 325°F or gas mark 2.

Crush biscuits with a rolling pin or in a food processor and transfer to a large stainless steel bowl with the desicated coconut. Melt the butter and mix with the biscuits until all crumbs are coated. Grease a pie dish or spring form pan (approx. 25cm diameter) and line with baking paper. Empty in the crumb mixture and press against the sides and bottom of the tin with the outer surface of a clean glass. Refrigerate.

Grate the lemon rind. Beat the cream cheese until smooth in a food processor or with an electric mixer. Add the eggs and beat well. Add the sour cream, castor sugar, lemon juice and rind. Beat until smooth. Occasionally use a spatula to scrape the mixture off the sides of the bowl. Pour the mixture into the crust. Bake for 50 mins - 1 hour then switch the oven off. Test to see if cooked by lightly touching the centre of the cheesecake to make sure the filling has just set. Do no over cook. Cool with the oven door slightly ajar. Refrigerate for several hours before serving with strawberry

Strawberry Coulis:

Combine 3/4 of the strawberries with the sugar in large saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar dissolves. Continue to cook for 10 minutes, stirring frequently, until berries are soft. Do not let mixture boil. Press mixture through a sieve into a bowl. Discard pulp. Return to pan and add the remaining strawberries, roughly chopped. Cook until strawberries are just warm then remove from heat. Stir in Grand Marnier. Serve warm coulis with cheesecake. Sauce will be thin, but can be thickened slightly by chilling.


