

#### **SMOKING BAN**

## NSW Smoke-free Environment Amendment Act 2004:

In October 2004, the then NSW Premier Bob Carr announced that smoking in indoor areas of licensed premises would be phased out by July 2007.

The rationale for this decision was to protect workers and guests from the adverse health effects of smoking caused by prolonged exposure to passive smoking in indoor public areas.

This legislation is known as the NSW Smoke-free Environment Amendment Act 2004.

To assist licensed premises adjust, three transitional phases have been provided in the lead-up to the 2007 ban.

Below is the last of the nonsmoking requirements under which ALL licensed venues will need to comply with.

From 2 July 2007

# THE NSW MASONIC CLUB & CASTLEREAGH BOUTIQUE HOTEL WILL BE A SMOKE FREE ENVIRONMENT:

- All enclosed areas of hotels, clubs and nightclubs that are open to the general public must be completely non-smoking, and all areas of Star City Casino with the exception of private gaming rooms must also be non-smoking.\*
- There will be no other exceptions.
- \* Smoking will only be permitted in the private gaming areas at Star City Casino, not including areas used substantially for gaming machines. This exception will be reviewed every 12 months to maintain parity with interstate casinos.


It was nice to see our Ex-Operations Manager Lee


There is a string of accomplishments to his credit, including awards for his musical studies and prizes taken at international music competitions.



## Sir Ernest Henry Shackleton 1874 - 1922

Elephant Islan

Ernest Henry Shackleton was born on 15 February 1874 in County Kildare, Ireland. His father was a doctor. The family moved to London where Shackleton was educated. Rejecting his father's wish that he

become a doctor, he joined the merchant navy when he was 16 and qualified as a master mariner in 1898. He travelled widely but was keen to explore the poles.

In 1901 Shackleton was chosen to go on the Antarctic expedition led by British naval officer Robert Falcon Scott on the ship Discovery. With Scott and one other, Shackleton trekked towards the South Pole in extremely difficult conditions, getting closer to the Pole than anyone had come before. Shackleton became seriously ill and had to return home but had gained valuable experience.


Back in Britain, Shackleton spent some time as a journalist and was then elected secretary of the Scottish Royal Geographical Society. In 1906, he unsuccessfully stood for Parliament in Dundee. In 1908, he returned to the Antarctic as the leader of

his own expedition, on the ship Nimrod. During the expedition, his team climbed Mount Erebus, made many important scientific discoveries and set a record by coming even closer to the South Pole than before. He was knighted on his return to Britain.

In 1911, Norwegian explorer Roald Amundsen reached the South Pole, followed by Scott who died on the return journey.

In 1914, Shackleton made his third trip to the Antarctic with the ship Endurance, planning to cross Antarctica via the South Pole. Early in 1915, Endurance became trapped in the ice, and ten months later sank. Shackleton's crew had already abandoned the ship to live on the floating ice. In April 1916, they set off in three small boats, eventually reaching Elephant Island. Taking five crew members, Shackleton went to find help. In a small boat, the six men spent 16 days crossing 1,300 km of ocean to reach South Georgia and then trekked across the island to a whaling station. The remaining men from the Endurance were rescued in August 1916. Not one member of the expedition died. 'South', Shackleton's account of the Endurance expedition, was published in 1919.

Shackleton's fourth expedition aimed to circumnavigate the Antarctic continent but on 5 January 1922, Shackleton died of a heart attack off South Georgia. He was buried on the island.



#### **Fact or Fiction**

The source of this often repeated advert and its variations has never been identified although many have sifted through scores of British newspapers in the attempt. It is said to have been placed by Shackleton during the planning of his Nimrod

expedition. It is widely beleived the ad first appeared in the 1949 pulp paperback, The 100 Greatest Advertisements, and that the apocryphal blurb was penned by the book's author, Julian Lewis Watkins

#### **Endurance Expedition - Timeline of Events**

August 1st 1914 - Day 1

Leaves London

December 30th 1914 - Day 151

Crosses Antartic Circle

February 24th 1915 - Day 207

Endurance becomes stuck in pack ice, and is slowly crushed

November 21st 1915 - Day 507

Endurance finally destroyed - sinks under ice. Crew's only hope is to sail out of Antarctic waters using the three small open lifeboats from Endurance. Note: they are still walking on the pack ice at this stage - so need to find open water first.

April 7th 1916 - Day 615

Spot Elephant Island on Horizon

April 16th 1916 - Day 624

After seven difficult days at sea, all crew arrive and setup camp on the first firm footing for over 16 months.

April 20th 1916 - Day 628

Whilst there is plenty of food, and some shelter, Shackleton realises there is no chance of rescue. There is a war going on in the Northern Hemisphere, and few would be concerned about a missing expedition to the Antarctic. There is also little chance of flagging down a passing whaling boat - the island is too far away from the established whaling islands in the Southern Ocean. He decides that he will attempt an 800 mile open water crossing to the nearest whaling station at South Georgia Island.

April 24th 1916 - Day 632

Shackleton and 5 others board the James Caird to attempt the navigation.

May 10th 1916 - Day 648

17 days of hell - bitterly cold seas, little fresh water, and nothing short of a miracle sees them arrive on the west side of the island of South Georgia. The wrong side of the island. The men are near dead - somewhere between hypothermia, exhaustion and dehyrdation, they are separated from the main whaling station by a massive, snow clad, never mapped, let alone crossed, mountain range. They rest for a week before setting out to cross the range.

May 20th 1916 - Day 658

Another miracle later, without rest, and without equipment, Shackleton and two others cross the range and arrive at the whaling station.

August 30th 1916 - Day 760

After three attempts, two thwarted by weather, Shackleton returns to Elephant island and picks up all his men.

Sir Ernest Shackleton was initiated into Navy Lodge No. 2612 (United Grand Lodge of England) on 9 July 1901.

Despite appearing on many Navy Lodge summonses throughout the period, Shackleton attended the first regular meeting of Guild of Freemen Lodge No. 3525 (United Grand Lodge of England) in 1911 and was passed to the second degree by that lodge on 2 November 1911.

He was raised to the degree of Master Mason at Guild of Freemen Lodge on 30 May 1913.

#### **MEET THE STAFF Scott John Atkinson**

#### Our new Head Chef in Cello's

I was born and brought up in Perthshire on the doorstep of the Scottish Highlands in the picture postcard town of Pitlochry. Heather covered hills, fast flowing rivers and peaceful lochs were my childhood playground. The 2,760 ft Ben-y-Vrackie was literally in my back garden!

I learned my cooking skills locally, principally under Neil McGown at the exclusive East Haugh House hotel near Pitlochry. While at school I had earned pocket money working as a 'pot boy' in a Pitlochry hotel kitchen. I'd planned to study civil engineering, but the more I learned about cooking, the greater the lure of the kitchen became. I suppose I'm now creating exciting structures out of meat, vegetables, fruit and fish rather than steel and concrete!

In my spare time I enjoy outdoor pursuits - particularly cycling and walking where I can push myself physically. A few months ago I was trekking in the Himalayas and reached the Everest base camp. That's my idea of relaxation.

I'm far from complacent and don't claim to know all the secrets of the culinary world. But I enjoy learning new things and I love a challenge. There is a lot of organisation needed in a kitchen this size and while I am eager to introduce new dishes I realise change has to be made gradually. The staff has to know and understand where we are going and, most importantly, our diners must find any new dishes tempting and satisfying. Keeping everyone happy and on side is my real challenge here.

# Fresh TOMATO CITRÓN

#### Ingredients

1/4 cup olive oil

2 large brown onions, diced

2 teaspoons finely grated orange zest

1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest

18 ripe Roma tomatoes, quartered

Salt and pepper to taste

Fresh basil leaves

Using a heavy saucepan set over medium heat, sauté onions in olive oil, stirring occasionally until tender and translucent, about 10 to 12 minutes.

Stir in orange zest and tomatoes and continue to cook over medium heat stirring occasionally to prevent scorching. about 20 minutes or until the tomatoes have broken down and rendered much of their liquid.


Purée soup in batches using either a food processor or blender. Then strain the mixture through a food mill or medium mesh sieve placed over a clean saucepan, discard remaining peel and seeds. Reheat soup mixture gently over medium-low heat, season with salt and pepper.

Just before serving (about 1-2 minutes before) add fresh basil, torn into small pieces to the soup.

Serve with a dollop of sour cream and grated parmesan.

Tip: For a rich and creamy soup add a splash of heavy or light cream. Repeat until you have reached the desired consistency.

# \$1,000,000 Donation to Rotary

When George Soukup returned to Prague after 43 years in Australia to take over a hotel his parents used to own before 1948, he found the hotel staff sadly lacking in any management training. "Marketing, managing for profit performance, ethics, computer skills, human resources skills ... were nonexistent," said Soukup, the co-founder of the Soukup Memorial Scholarship.

After the fall of communism, the Hotel Meteor in Prague was restituted to Soukup. He sold the hotel in 1993 and used the proceeds to set up the Soukup Memorial Scholarship. The scholarship is a bridge between the country of his parents' birth and the country that provided a home for them in their hour of need.

In Memoriam of Vaclav and Bed'a Soukup, the SMS Trust was established by deed dated 8 March 1996 for the purpose of providing an annual scholarship to a student of Czech or Slovak citizenship to undertake a one year Diploma of Business Management - Hospitality programme at Bond University.

Over the past ten years changes have been necessary as the courses offered at Bond University and the situation in the Czech and Slovak republics have

The purposes for which the SMS Trust was established are no longer needed (there being appropriate and adequate education facilities in Europe now available to Czech and Slovak students in hospitality).

Accordingly, the Board of Trustees decided to determine the Trust and distribute the funds to an organisation or organisations that the board considers will carry out works for the benefit of the community and that would be a fitting continuing memoriam to Vaclav and Bed'a Soukup, and that are consistent with the residual beneficiaries of the Trust as allowed in the deed constituting the Soukup Memorial Scholarship.

The Board of the Trustee of The Soukup Memorial Scholarship admires the work of the Rotary club of Sydney and is grateful the Governors of the Board are pleased to accept the funds and provide scholarships there from into the future.
