

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

Hello and welcome to our mid year members' magazine. It's hard to believe that we have reached the half way mark of the year. I am pleased to report to all that the long anticipated air conditioning upgrade will commence next

month on Monday 21st July. These works will be funded without borrowings and represent a considerable capital outlay from this Club. We have already completed an upgrade of air conditioning services on Levels 6 & 7 and we are now installing new equipment throughout, on Levels 8, 9, 10 & 11. This upgrade is a very expensive exercise and will not only benefit our members but hotel guests as well. We expect to conclude these extensive works in October of this year, just in time for our peak trading period leading into summer. There will be some periods where there may be some noise issues in relation to this upgrade and we will endeavour to keep any noise to a minimum.

The first half of this year has been a busy time for us with a number of maintenance related projects now completed. Our initial focus was the bathrooms with the ladies restroom upgraded on Level 4, the men's restroom upgraded on Level 5 and the ladies restroom at reception all now completed.

We have also concluded upgrades in the Meeting Rooms on Levels 1 & 5, with an extensive refurbishment of both areas also concluded. You will be pleased to see the result of the foyer reception upgrade as this was refurbished and refitted to a very high standard. These works also include a full restoration of the marble flooring in the foyer and members will be pleased to hear that all these projects were funded out of cash flow. The Board of Directors, Management and Staff are committed to maintaining this building in its original Art Deco style wherever possible and look forward to further enhancing the features of this unique Heritage Listed building

The current economic climate, with high interest rates, high fuel costs and increasing pressure on inflation will have some impact on performance during the 2008/2009 period. We are all suffering but I am confident that we can move through this difficult time and deliver reasonable and expected outcomes. I do provide this synopsis as we are a registered club and operate a four star hotel as our core business. Both these industries, "like most," have been impacted greatly over the last twelve months and this will continue to be the case moving through the 2008/2009 financial year.





Henry Ford was born on July 30, 1863, on a farm near Dearborn, Michigan. He had little interest in school, never learning to spell or read well, and left at the age of fifteen. Preferring to work with mechanical objects, particularly watches, he repaired his first watch when he was thirteen years old, and would continue to repair watches for enjoyment throughout his life.

In 1879 Ford left for Detroit, Michigan, to become an apprentice at a machine shop. He then moved to the Detroit Drydock Company. During his apprenticeship he also worked nights repairing clocks and watches.

Ford's father wanted him to be a farmer and offered him forty acres of timberland, provided he give up machinery. Ford Ford spent two years on the farm and during this time married Clara Bryant.

Ford began working for the Edison Illuminating Company, which later became the Detroit Edison Company. By 1891 he had left the farm permanently. Four years later he became chief engineer. While at the Edison Illuminating Company he met Thomas A. Edison, who eventually became one of his closest friends.

In 1893 he created his first gasoline driven buggy or Quadricycle that was completely self propelled.

In 1899 Ford formed the Detroit Automobile Company, which collapsed after he disagreed with his financial backers. His next venture was the unsuccessful Henry Ford Automobile Company.By this time Ford had conceived the idea of a low-priced

car for the masses, although cars were generally considered cars as only for the rich.

The Ford Motor Company, founded in 1903. Ford began production of a Model A, and followed with other models, to the letter S. The public responded, and the company flourished.

In 1908 Ford made the important decision to manufacture only one type of car - the Model T, or the "Tin Lizzie." The Model T was durable, easy to operate, and economical, and came in one color - black. Within four years Ford was producing over forty thousand cars per year.

During this rapid expansion Ford held firmly to two principles: cutting costs by increasing productivity and paying high wages to his employees. Hiring and keeping the best employee's meant lower cost and increased efficiency by undertaking a program that involved a five day work week, a reduction from nine to an eight hour work day and an increase in minimum daily pay from \$2.34 to \$500.

In 1913 the cars were being mass produced by one of the first moving assembly lines, reducing production time for a single car by more then ten hours. A Model T could be produced in approximately one and half hours.

In 1914 he startled the industrial world by raising the minimum wage to five dollars a day, almost double the company's average wage. In addition, the "Tin Lizzie" had dropped in price from \$850 to \$600; it later went down to \$360.

Ford was now an internationally known figure. In 1918 his race for the U.S.

Senate as a Democrat met a narrow defeat.

By the end of World War I his giant River Rouge plant, the world's largest industrial facility, was near completion. Ford gained total control of the company by buying the outstanding stock.

In the early 1920s the company continued its rapid growth, at one point producing 60 percent of the total United States output. Problems began to arise as Ford continued to rely on the Model T even though public tastes had changed. By the middle of the decade Ford had lost his dominant position to the General Motors company. In 1926 Henry finally decided to design a newer more modern car which resulted in the also very popular Model A Ford. In 1927 production of the Model T ceased. The Model A went on sale in 1927 after a great deal of technical design and innovation and finished production in 1931 after over 4 million vehicles were

Ford engaged in some philanthropic or charitable activity, such as the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. The Ford Foundation was established in 1936 and now one of the world's largest foundations, was to avoid estate taxes.

Henry Ford survived a stroke in 1938 when he turned over the business to his son Edsel, but when his son died in 1943 Henry took over once again.

Ford's grandson, Henry Ford II, took over the company after World War II.

Henry died in 1947 of a cerebral hemorrhage at age 83 in Fair Lane, and was buried in the Ford Cemetery in Detroit

100 YEARS OF THE MODEL T 1908 - 2008

Henry Ford had a vision to create a car that was simple, affordable, and versatile—a "car for the great multitude." He realised his vision with the creation of the Model T. It was strong, lightweight, simple to repair, and capable of providing years of service in difficult conditions. It was an appealing and practical tool that anyone with an average income could afford, and it changed almost every aspect of American culture. Between 1908 and 1927, the Ford Motor Company produced over 15 million Model Ts, offering reliability, mobility, and freedom of movement that was unprecedented and previously beyond the dreams of average Americans. At the height of its popularity, it was manufactured in 20 countries, on every continent except Antarctica.

The Model T was offered in many different models throughout its history. All of these body styles were built with the same engine and essentially the same chassis: the Model T roadster, coupe, coupelet, runabout, roadster torpedo, town car, touring, and the fordor and tudor sedans.

You can paint it any color... so long as it's black

No one really knows if Henry Ford ever said that the buying public could have Model T Fords "in any color, so long as it's black", but it is commonly attributed to him.

Some suggest that Ford chose black because the paint dried faster than other colored paints available at the time, and a faster drying paint would allow him to build cars faster by reducing the drying time. However, there is no fact to support this theory.

Over 30 different types of black paint were used to paint various parts of the Model T. The different types of paint were formulated to satisfy the different means of applying the paint to the different parts, and had different drying times. Ford engineering documents suggest that the color black was chosen because it was cheap and it was durable.

Prior to 1913, cars were available in Green, Red, Blue and Gray. In fact, in the first year, Model T Fords were not available in Black at all!




DRESS REGULATIONS
