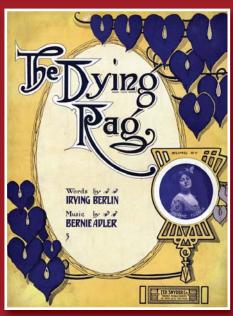
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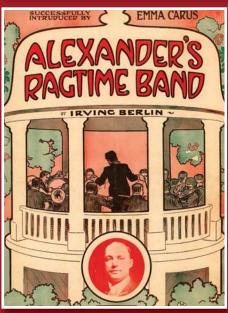

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Members,

Since my last report, much has been happening in the Club, for the betterment of yourselves, your guests and our hotel guests.

The long awaited air conditioning work on floors, 8 to 11 and some small adjustments to the existing air conditioning on floors 6 & 7 will when you read this have been completed. This work has revealed some other areas where remedial treatment is necessary and your Board and

Management will deal with these problems both promptly and prudently.

As reported by the General Manager in this edition of the magazine, additional work has also been undertaken to improve our hotel bathrooms. All of these works are vital not only to the upkeep and improvement of our most tangible asset, our heritage building, but are equally vital to our maintaining our vital 4 star hotel rating so important to our room rates.

Our Annual General Meeting will be conducted in Cello's Restaurant on floor 4 on Monday 24th November commencing at 1pm sharp. Light refreshments will be served after the meeting. Your attendance will be warmly welcomed.

Hearty congratulations are due to all those concerned in the Club being named as a finalist in the Deluxe Accommodation Section of the 2008 NSW Tourism Awards. Results will be known in November.

With the approach of Christmas, I urge you all to enjoy this all important occasion in a responsible Happy and Holy way.

Irving Berlin 1888 - 1989

Israel Isidore Baline (or Beilin) was born May 11, 1888, to a Jewish family and was the youngest of eight children. In 1893 his family immigrated to the United States from Russia and his father, Moses who was a Jewish cantor, worked as a cantor in local synagogues and also certifying kosher meat. Berlin's family was too poor to provide piano lessons, let alone a piano, however his father, Moses, gave him a love of melody and a quick wit.

Following the death of his father in 1896, Irving found himself having to work to survive. He did various street jobs, including selling newspapers and busking. He was eventually hired as a singing waiter at Pelham Café. Berlin became well known and when two waiters at a rival café wrote a song and had it published, Pelham asked Berlin and the resident pianist, Nick Nicholson to write a song. The two wrote "Marie from Sunny Italy," and it was soon published. Although it earned him only 37 cents, it gave Berlin a new career and a new name: Israel Beilin was misprinted as "I. Berlin" on the sheet music.

In 1908 Berlin ended up "accidentally" writing a melody to go with some lyrics he had written for a potential song about an Italian marathoner named Dorando. When Berlin tried to sell the lyrics, they assumed he also had a tune to go with the words. Though he had a sense for melody, at this time, Berlin could not play piano. Not wanting to lose the opportunity to make a sale, Berlin found an arranger to whom he dictated a potential melody. Berlin had his first complete song, Dorando.

Later Berlin became a self-taught pianist, reputedly restricting himself mainly to the black keys of the piano. He bought a special piano, enabling him to transpose his music mechanically. He once explained his compositional method: "I get an idea, either a title or a phrase or a melody, and hum it out to something definite. When I have completed a song and memorised it, I dictate it to an arranger." Throughout his career the arrangers were never credited as co-composers.

Berlin was married twice. His first wife, singer Dorothy Goetz, contracted typhoid fever on their honeymoon to Cuba, and died five months after their wedding in 1912. Her death inspired Berlin's song "When I Lost You", which became one of his earliest hits. His second wife was Ellin Mackay, a devout Irish-American Catholic and heiress to the Comstock Lode mining fortune. They were married in 1926, against the wishes of both his family, who objected to religious intermarriage, and her father, Clarence

Mackay, a prominent Roman Catholic lavman, who disinherited her. Finances were not a problem, however, as Berlin assigned her the rights to his song "Always" which yielded her a huge and steady income. The couple had three daughters - Mary Ellin Barrett, Linda Emmett, and Elizabeth Peters and a son, Irving Berlin, Jr., who died as an infant on Christmas Day.

Over the span of his career Irving Berlin produced an outpouring of ballads, dance numbers, novelty tunes and love songs that defined American popular song for much of the century. A sampling of just some of the Irving Berlin standards included: How Deep Is the Ocean?, White Christmas, Always, Anything You Can Do, I Can Do Better, There's No Business Like Show Business, Cheek To Cheek, Puttin' On The Ritz, A Pretty Girl Is Like A Melody and Easter Parade.

Berlin wrote seventeen complete scores for Broadway musicals and revues, and contributed material to six more. Among the shows featuring all-Berlin scores were The Cocoanuts, As Thousands Cheer, Louisiana Purchase, Miss Liberty, Mister President, Call Me Madam and the phenomenally successful Annie Get Your Gun.

Among the Hollywood movie musical classics with scores by Irving Berlin are Top Hat, Follow The Fleet, On The Avenue, Alexander's Ragtime Band, Holiday Inn, This Is The Army, Blue Skies, Easter Parade, White Christmas and There's No Business Like Show Business. Among his many awards were a special Tony Award (1963) and the Academy Award for Best Song of the Year (White Christmas) in 1942. Irving Berlin was a co-founder of ASCAP. founder of his own music publishing company, and, with producer Sam Harris, built his own Broadway Theatre, the Music Box. An unabashed patriot, his love for, and generosity to, his country is legendary. Through many of his foundations, including the God Bless America Fund and This Is The Army Inc. he donated millions of dollars in royalties to Army Emergency Relief, the Boy and Girl Scouts and other organisations.

Irving Berlin's centennial in 1988 was celebrated world-wide, culminating in an all-star tribute at Carnegie Hall featuring Frank Sinatra, Leonard Bernstein, Isaac Stern, Natalie Cole and Willie Nelson, On September 22nd 1989, at the age of 101, Berlin died in his sleep in New York City.

With a life that spanned more than 100 years and a catalogue that boasted over 1000 songs, Irving **Berlin epitomised Jerome** Kern's famous maxim, that "Irving Berlin has no place in American music - he is American music".

Tell us about yourself and your hospitality background? I am a cheerful guy who enjoys playing sports and doing different activities. Most of all I love being around family and friends where I feel comfortable.

I always had passion for hospitality. ever since I was a little boy overseas I enjoyed watching my cousin work in his restaurant. Even then I knew hospitality would be my profession. Most of all I enjoy fulfilling my duties at work and making sure our customers are satisfied. In addition I love hospitality as there is a variety of things you can do and never get bored of them.

What are you current job responsibilities? My current job responsibilities are to fulfil customer needs from the moment they arrive to the moment they depart from the hotel. As I work for two different departments in the hotel Food and Beverage and Reception I improved my skills and gained new ones. As a Receptionist my responsibilities are to book the quest into the hotel, check the quest in and out as well as to make them as comfortable as possible. On the other side in Food and Beverage department my responsibilities are to serve the quest and leave positive impression on them by doing the best job I can.

What do you enjoy most about your current job? I enjoy that I work in a family oriented environment where everyone is friendly and willing to make a new friend. I also enjoy working for two different departments and I'm grateful for the opportunity to learn and develop not only as a worker but also as a person. I would like to thank the management which gave me the opportunity to work in different parts of the hotel.

Do you have any favourite hobby? Tell us what do you do in your spare time?

My preferred hobbies are sports and movies. I have the passion for movies no matter if they are old black and white or late release, as long as they have a good story line I enjoy watching them.

Monique Pengelly was recently diagnosed as having keratoconus and in the time since has lost the sight in her right eye and had failing sight in her left.

Keratoconus is an inherited condition of the cornea. The cornea is the transparent front surface of the eve. In keratoconus, the normally round cornea becomes thinned, distorted and irregular (cone shaped). This abnormal shape prevents the light entering the eye from being focused correctly on the retina and causes distortion of vision. Because of the cornea's irregular shape, patients with keratoconus are usually very nearsighted and have a high degree of astigmatism that is not correctable with glasses. Keratoconus does not cause total blindness. However it can lead to significant vision impairment resulting in legal blindness.

A very rare condition it is virtually unknown in one so young (She is 10 years old). Apparently it is seen more often in post puberty adolescents. The method of overcoming this is by corneal graft but this cannot be performed until the patient is 22 years of age. With the speed that her eyesight was deteriorating Monique would be blind very soon. She would then have to spend the next 12 or so years without sight. As these are important years in any individuals life you will understand the family's desire to do the best for their child.

After consultations with New Zealand doctors she was referred to Dr John Males of the Sydney Eve hospital who examined her and suggested a technique known as Collagen Cross Linking with ultraviolet light and Riboflavin drops in the left eye to save her some sight.

We do not have an Ophthalmologist in New Zealand able to carry out this procedure but Dr Adam Watson of Auckland has been trained but is still developing his experience. It is my understanding that he will be involved with Monique's case in some way which will add to the benefits gained for this country.

Much of the medical information was beyond me as a ex school principal but I understand that the cornea loses strength and cannot maintain a normal shape interfering with vision. We have a Doctor amongst our members and his knowledge and input has been most

It was some time ago that Monigue's Mum approached a Lion from the Ngaruawahia Lions Club in the Waikato requesting assistance on how to go about fundraising so she could take her daughter to Sydney for the operation. The family lived in the Chartwell area of Hamilton so the Ngaruawahia Club passed the information to the Chartwell Lions Club where the problem lay on the table for a couple of months while the members of the Youth Committee pondered the problem and gathered information. Two of the club members, Norm Roberts and Mery Kelman met the family and became committed to assisting. Most of the clubs funds had been spent and it was estimated that at least \$8,000 was needed. One of the club members is a medical doctor and he was brought into the team. Dr Paul Henry approached an ophthalmologist colleague to get more information on the sight problem and the possible cure. All in order so the Club

launched into addressing the problem. Two avenues of action proceeded 1) contacting Lions Clubs in Sydney and 2) raising \$8,000 in three weeks

PID Lucy Armstrong, a member of the Chartwell Club, contacted PDG Carol

Alderson in Australia about the problem and Carol contacted PDG Lindsay Payne of the Lions Club of Sydney. Lindsay must be an action man because he got on to the case immediately and arranged free accommodation for Monique and her Mum at the Masonic Castlereagh Boutique Hotel located very close to the hospital where Monique was to have the operation. Greg & Margaret Lazarus members of the Sydney Market Industries Club were also contacted by PDG Carol and immediately donated NZD 500 to assist with the costs.

Back in New Zealand the Chartwell Lions Club got into action. An application for \$4,000 was sent off to the Llovd Morgan Lions Clubs Charitable Trust and four fund raising projects were organised; a sausage sizzle at Bunnings, a garden clean-up job, a garage sale and a car wash. A flooring company operator heard about the project and as he was moving the location of his business gave two small truckloads of part rolls of linoleum for the garage sale. These projects ran over two weekends, the weather on the weekend of the car wash was terrible and the project had to be cancelled. With the money raised by the Ngaruawahia Lions Club and \$4,000 from the LMI CCT. Monique and her Mum could go to Sydney with the confidence that all bills will be paid.

On arrival in Sydney and while recovering from the operation, the Sydney Lions supported Monique and her Mum. The highlight for Monique was a visit hosted by Greg & Margaret Lazarus of the Sydney Market Industries Club to the Featherdale Wildlife Park. Monique's Mum was overawed by the friendliness and kindness that they received from the Sydney Lions and what really impressed her was that all the assistance came from people that new nothing about her other than the family situation but were prepared to help and who went out of their way to meet the costs and make their time in Sydney as enjoyable as possible.

Although there are a number of follow ups to be done it would appear that the procedure has been successful to date.

Since being back in New Zealand she has been seen by Dr Watson who continues to monitor her progress. She has also been able to resume her schooling.

Everyone has high hopes that this progress will be maintained and she will have as near normal life as possible over the years until a permanent solution is carried out when she is older.

The principal activities of the Club during the year were to operate a boutique hotel, and to provide Members with amenities and facilities usually associated with a Licensed Social Club.

No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

Operating Results

The profit for the year amounted to \$532,666 (2007 \$332,386) after providing for income tax of \$115,575 (2007 \$95,264).

Review of Operations

Despite an industry wide slump in occupancy levels in the last quarter of the financial year, the hotel achieved an occupancy utilisation comparable with its competitors. The maintenance of the four star rating and our room rates ameliorated the effects of the slump.

In May of this year the Club outsourced its food outlets throughout the building resulting in substantial savings.

After Balance Date Events

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may affect the operations of the Club, the result of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Club in future financial years.

Future Developments

During the 2008/9 financial year, the Club plans to upgrade the remaining bathrooms throughout the hotel. Potential issues concerning the operations of the Club and the consequent financial impact in future years have not been included in this report, as such in conclusion would, potentially result in unreasonable prejudice against the Club. It is also anticipated that the Heritage Floor Space allocation will be sold within the next twelve months.

Significant Changes

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Club during the year.

Environmental Issues

The Club's operations are regulated by a significant environmental regulation under a law of New South Wales relating to smoking in the Club premises.

Options

No options over unissued interests in the Club were granted during or since the end of the financial year and there were no options outstanding at the date of this report.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report includes the financial statements and notes of New South Wales Masonic Club.

Basis of Preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below. They have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs... modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities

The charge for current income tax expense is based on the profit for the year adjusted for any non-assessable or disallowed items. It is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or are substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method in respect of temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. No deferred income tax will be recognised from the initial recognition of any asset or liability, excluding a business combination, where there is no effect on accounting or taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or liability is settled. Deferred tax is credited in the income statement except where it relates to items that may be credited directly to equity, in which case the deferred tax is adjusted directly against equity.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future tax profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

The amount of benefits brought to account or which may be realised in the future is based on the assumption that no adverse change will occur in income taxation legislation and the anticipation that the economic entity will derive sufficient future assessable income to enable the benefit to be realised and comply with the conditions of deductibility imposed by the law.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Freehold land and buildings are shown at their fair

value (being the amount for which an asset could be exchanged between knowledgeable knowing parties in an arm's length transaction), based on periodic valuations by external independent valuers. less subsequent depreciation for buildings.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluation of land and buildings are credited to a revaluation reserve in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the income statement. Each year the difference between depreciation based on the revalued carrying amount of the asset charged to the income statement and depreciation based on the asset's original cost is transferred from the revaluation reserve to retained earnings.

Any accumulated depreciation at the date of revaluation is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset.

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost

The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, are depreciated on a straight line or diminishing value basis over their useful lives to the Club commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The gain or loss on disposal of all fixed assets is determined as the difference between the carrying amount of the asset at the time of disposal and the proceeds of disposal, and is included in the profit from ordinary activities before income tax of the Club in the year of disposal.

NOTE 2: FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS Recognition

Financial instruments are initially measured at cost on trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the related contractual rights or obligations exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured as set out below.

Financial assets at fair value through profit

A financial asset is classified in this category if acquired principally for the purpose of selling in the short term or if so designated by management and within the requirements of AASB 139: Recognition and Measurement of Financial Instruments. Realised and unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of these assets are included in the income statement in the period in which they arise.

Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial

assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method

Held-to-maturity investments

These investments have fixed maturities, and it is the Club's intention to hold these investments to maturity. Any held-to-maturity investments held by the Club are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets include any financial assets not included in the above categories. Available-for-sale financial assets are reflected at fair value. Unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in fair value are taken directly to equity.

Financial Liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost, comprising original debt less principal payments and amortisation.

Fair Value

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the Club assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. In the case of available-for-sale financial instruments, a prolonged decline in the value of the instrument is considered to determine whether an impairment has arisen. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Club reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

Leases of fixed assets where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset, but not the legal ownership, are transferred to the Club and classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised, recording an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any quaranteed residual values. Leased assets are amortised on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Club's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee benefits payable later than one

year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made by the Club to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Club has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon delivery of goods to customers

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon delivery of the service to customers.

Membership income is recognised on a proportional basis over the period to which the renewal relates Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has

been established. All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Where required, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

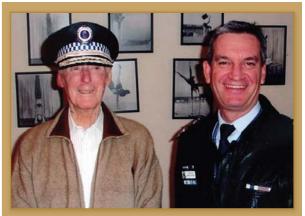

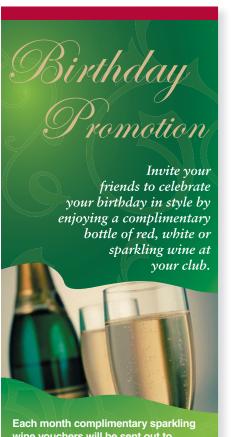

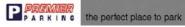
